

SET SUBJECT FEBRUARY 2022

Forced perspective is a photography technique that uses the space between your subjects to create an interesting or unusual relationship between them. This photography treatment manipulates the viewer's perception of the space and distance between two objects, creating an optical illusion.

Forced perspective manipulates our own perceptions and challenges what we see with how our brain can process it. In effect, it is the intentional creation of a certain perspective to make our brains think in a certain manner.

For example, an object could be positioned in such a way that it appears much larger or smaller than it actually is. The object obviously is exactly the size that it should be, but the way that it has been framed creates a perspective that is unusual and thus confuses our mind. Forced perspective photography is some of the most creative and imaginative of its kind.



Extreme Macro

What is Extreme Macro? There is no standard definition for extreme macro, but there is a tentative definition which gives some insight into its unusual nature.

Macro photography (1:1) is usually pursued using off-the-shelf lens and camera equipment, whilst microphotography (10:1+) is undertaken using microscope equipment. Extreme macro covers the range between these two, and borrows apparatus used by both specialties to make images.



Macro photography, and especially macro photography of insects, is one of the most popular types of photography around. A lot of macro photographers want to move onto extreme macro focus stacking - but they don't really know where to start. I had much the same problem; useful information about this photography niche is hard to find... Certainly there are many Extreme Macro

images on the 'Net - just no information on exactly how to go about taking them.

In terms of first steps, in order of difficulty and expense: to do extreme macro, move on from standard 1:1 magnification macro into more extreme macro by using close-up Raynox 150 lenses (these clip to the front of standard lenses) first because they give you nice in-camera control. Then, if greater magnification is for you (approx. between 1:1 and 4:1), consider taking the next step in your extreme macro photography by doing some reverse lens macro: with old 35mm enlarger lenses on a simple set of bellows. (Les Porter, our Club Patron has a good selection of used enlarger lenses for sale).

You can download a trial copy of either Zerene Stacker or Helicon Focus and try some macro focus stacking.

Beyond this, look towards an infinite microscope objective lens on a conventional 200mm lens, driven by an electronically controlled stacking stage such as a WeMacro or Cognysis Stackshot.

Depending on the equipment you already have, other routes like stacking two lenses will also work for you if you have them, but the sequence above is probably a reasonable progression path for most people both in terms of cost and in terms of picking up gradual know-how.

It is possible to do Extreme Macro imaging with quite modest equipment, but I guarantee it will open your eyes to photographic possibilities you never realised were within your grasp!

The LMIC was a success again last year. A total of 3843 entries were received from 250 entrants from 24 different countries. Our club was well represented, with entries from 18 members.

The Circuit consisted of three separate exhibitions, which meant that the images were all judges three times by different panels of judges. There were six sections in each exhibition (Colour, Monochrome Nature, Wildlife, Photojournalism and Photo Travel).

The catalogues (one for each exhibition), which contain all the award-winning and accepted images can be viewed on the <u>Circuit website</u>. It is worth spending some time reviewing the catalogues to get a good idea of the standard of image that is necessary for acceptance in an international exhibition.

As you work through the catalogues you will see that many of our club members were very successful, with the following members gaining awards: Susan Slack, Margot Hughes, Jennifer Carrigan, Phil Whiteman, Annette Collins, Dennis Archibald, Helen Walker, Susan Hansell, Ian Marriner, Trevor Cotterill, Carol McGrath, Rob Oyston and Chris Mannweiler.

Roy Killen, who Chaired the Lake Macquarie International for the past two years and the Lake Macquarie National for the three years before that, is stepping down from that role. 2022 Portfolio Project

A Photographic Portfolio is a body of work that reflects the photographers personal style and photographic interest.

Last year the club ran a "Portfolio Competition" for the first time to allow members the opportunity to expand their skills into another area of photography. This "competition" encompassed a presentation early in the year by Craig Parker who outlined his approach to his Portfolio Grading submission to PSA, the "competition" itself and subsequent judging by Craig and club ZOOM session where the results were presented by Craig and the entrants had an opportunity to discuss their work. There was very positive feedback from members and the club decided to run something similar in 2022.

This year rather than a competition the club will provide an opportunity for members to work in a collaborative mentored group to develop a portfolio of images that could be presented to club members later in the year.

The 2022 Portfolio Exercise will be based on:

Working collaboratively in a study group

The groups will operate as learning groups, not competitive groups

The emphasis will be on participation and contribution

Each group will have an experienced facilitator/leader, not a controller who will mentor the members of the group

Each member will be expected to produce a portfolio of images that includes a title, composite image and a statement of intent. Guidelines for the Portfolio Exercise will allow some flexibility:

- Up to 5 Word Title;
- Up to 75 word Portfolio Statement;
- From 6 to 10 Images as an "Overview Image" with maximum dimensions specified.

During the year:

- Members indicate they wish to participate
- Members are placed into groups. Group size to be determined to allow good participation and involvement.
- Groups have a kick-off meeting (via Zoom) where each person talks briefly about what they are thinking of as a Portfolio Topic; Also establish group ground rules at this session;
- Progress meetings monthly or bi-monthly via Zoom; share, discuss, provide feedback to others; Evaluating others work and giving feedback is also part of the learning process. Limit number giving feedback (say 2 or 3) on each project, but everyone has to give feedback on at least 1 project;
- Could have a guest mentor/speaker once or twice during the year;

At the end of the year, those willing, present their work to the Club, show it and briefly talk about it


Critique Corner
