

SET SUBJECT MARCH 2022 - CREATIVE PHOTOGRAPHY

The Images for this section may be colour or monotone. The image may be of any subject matter and **must obviously display a change** in natural colour, form, shape or any combination of these three. All images must be original and may not incorporate elements produced by anyone else. Artwork or computer graphics generated by the entrant may be incorporated if the original photographic content predominates. Images may not be constructed entirely within a computer.

High Dynamic Range (HDR) images without further changes are not considered "Altered Reality."

Belmont 16s Photography Club - Public Liability Insurance

Following advice from Belmont 16s Sailing Club (the parent Club) that we would be unable to use the club premises for our print nights and tutorial nights the Committee has been making enquiries about another venue and as you know we settled on Valentine Bowling Club (VBC) as an excellent alternative. This then led to consideration about whether the parent Club's Public Liability Insurance (PL) would cover us whilst we were not meeting on the Belmont 16s premises. What has become clear from these discussions with Club Management is that it does NOT provide cover for any activities that do not occur on their premises. However, VBC's PL Insurance would cover our members either as social members of VBC (if you choose to join) or, as visitors.

Members should be aware that at present there is no PL Insurance cover in place for any other Club activities. Bus outings and ferry trips undertaken in the past may have provided some level of cover via the businesses used to undertake those trips.

Your Committee is continuing to investigate the viability of taking out our own Belmont 16s Photography Club insurance but, in the meantime members need to be aware that there is no insurance cover unless the gathering is on a Club premises. Therefore, social occasions, photo shoots and other outings are not official Belmont 16s Photography Club activities at this time. We are not stopping members from doing anything privately but, at this stage we are not organising any official Club activities that are not on premises where we are covered by PL insurance.



History of Photography Snippets...

So, what is meant by a "Stop"?

During the early years of photography, the time that it took the camera to create an exposure limited the photographer's ability to record movement and to freeze their subjects while moving.

Photographers were more concerned initially with getting the correct amount of light onto glass surfaces coated with very insensitive (by modern standards) materials that would record the exposure.

A lens without 'stops' would allow the passing of maximum quantity of light possible (depending on the glass used).

If a photographer wanted to reduce the amount of light, they would 'stop' some of it, by pushing a piece of metal with a hole in it into the path of the light passing through the lens.

They would have a number of these pieces of metal, with varying sized holes, which allowed just the right amount of light to pass.

These pieces of metal were known as Waterhouse stops & could also be in the form of 'washers' which were dropped into a slot on the rear of the lens barrel.

The next, improved version is the 'Wheel stop' - here a disc of metal with a series of holes in it is revolved until the correct hole lined up.

Wheel stops, being part of the actual lens barrel, were impossible to lose & became very popular until the final form of stopping, that we are now familiar with - the iris diaphragm came along. The iris diaphragm has the great advantage of being continuously adjustable.

It must be remembered that in the latter part of the 1800s through to the 1920s, film speeds were incredibly slow - with many images made with minutes of exposure time, so shutters were not needed in the early days - rather the photographer simply replaced the lens cap to end the exposure.

Photography, Social Media and Copyright

Most members will be aware that Belmont 16s Photography Club have a Facebook and Instagram page. The Facebook page is private and is curated by Bev Woodman and our Instagram page by Carol McGrath. The Facebook page is used as an informal way for members to share some of their work and to stay in touch, whilst the recently added Instagram page is being used (with the photographers blessing) to display the work of our members as a way of promoting our club and showcasing some of the images that do well in our club competitions.

Bill Chambers who has had some experience in this area has explained that club members who post images on these platforms have "instant" protection under Australian law as soon as the shutter is pressed.

However, that IS NOT the case internationally - especially under US law, which now allows for "Orphaned Works" - which effectively surrenders copyright status for anything that doesn't carry a copyright symbol or an attribution along the lines of "Copyright 2021 Bill Chambers". Copyright certainly doesn't guarantee international protection.

Some will inevitably say "it's only a photo" ... but that image can be worth a lot in some instances.

The Club Instagram page states that all images posted remain the property of the photographer and Carol also encourages members to supply her with images that carry a copyright watermark.

Members need to appreciate that copying and using images obtained on social media platforms should not be done without the permission of the person who has taken that image. "Under Australian law, you must hold all copyright rights in a film or photo in order to publish it online. If not, you must obtain a Release or other written authority from the party or parties having copyright, granting you the right to publish the work online".

This includes sections of someone else's work used in your photography. For those who want to dig into this in more detail they can find information at the following sites.

There are royalty free sites where you can download images if needed for art purposes.

If you have photographed a professional model you should obtain a release before you publish their image on a social media platform and be particularly careful of posting images of children online even if you think you have permission.

Introducing the OM SYSTEM OM-1 Interchangeable Lens Camera

Review with Bill Chambers

The OM System OM-1 is the first high-end Micro Four Thirds mirrorless camera from OM Digital Solutions, the company that bought the Olympus camera business. It's a rugged, image-stabilized 20MP camera capable of high-speed shooting and offering a range of computational photography modes.

Key Specifications

20MP quad-pixel AF Stacked CMOS sensor (capable of recording 80Mp images)

Environmental sealing rated to IP53

1053 X-type AF points

Blackout-free shooting at up to 50 fps with AF and AE, 120 fps with AF and AE locked Image stabilization rated to 7EV of correction (8EV with compatible lenses)

4K (UHD or DCI) at up to 60p, in a choice of 8 or 10 bit

1080 capture at up to 240 fps

Twin UHS-II card slots

Recognition-based subject tracking

The camera can achieve up to 10 frames per second (fps) with its mechanical shutter, but this jumps to 120 fps (blackout-free) using the electronic shutter.

It can capture 4K video (UHD or DCI) at up to 60 fps and Full HD (1080p) video at up to 240 fps. Internally, the camera can record H.264 (8-bit) video or H.265 (10-bit) video.

The sensor is mounted to a 5-axis image stabilization system that offers up to eight stops of exposure compensation, which is used to power its 'High-Res Shot' mode that can capture up to 50MP images handheld and up to 80MP images in a special 'Tripod High-Res Shot' mode.

The OM-1 represents a new naming scheme for OM System cameras and is released to coincide with the 50th anniversary of the original OM film SLR. The OM-1 continues to carry the 'Olympus' name across its viewfinder in recognition of this legacy, but it's likely to be the last model that will do so. The OM-1 will be available from early March 2022.

2022 Portfolio Project

A Photographic Portfolio is a body of work that reflects the photographers personal style and photographic interest.

Last year the club ran a "Portfolio Competition" for the first time to allow members the opportunity to expand their skills into another area of photography. This "competition" encompassed a presentation early in the year by Craig Parker who outlined his approach to his Portfolio Grading submission to PSA, the "competition" itself and subsequent judging by Craig and club ZOOM session where the results were presented by Craig and the entrants had an opportunity to discuss their work. There was very positive feedback from members and the club decided to run something similar in 2022.

This year rather than a competition the club will provide an opportunity for members to work in a collaborative mentored group to develop a portfolio of images that could be presented to club members later in the year.

The 2022 Portfolio Exercise will be based on:

Working collaboratively in a study group

The groups will operate as learning groups, not competitive groups

The emphasis will be on participation and contribution

Each group will have an experienced facilitator/leader, not a controller who will mentor the members of the group

Each member will be expected to produce a portfolio of images that includes a title, composite image and a statement of intent. Guidelines for the Portfolio Exercise will allow some flexibility:

- Up to 5 Word Title;
- Up to 75 word Portfolio Statement;
- From 6 to 10 Images as an "Overview Image" with maximum dimensions specified.

During the year:

- Members indicate they wish to participate
- Members are placed into groups. Group size to be determined to allow good participation and involvement.
- Groups have a kick-off meeting (via Zoom) where each person talks briefly about what they are thinking of as a Portfolio Topic; Also establish group ground rules at this session;
- Progress meetings monthly or bi-monthly via Zoom; share, discuss, provide feedback to others; Evaluating others work and giving feedback is also part of the learning process. Limit number giving feedback (say 2 or 3) on each project, but everyone has to give feedback on at least 1 project;
- Could have a guest mentor/speaker once or twice during the year;

At the end of the year, those willing, present their work to the Club, show it and briefly talk about it


Critique Corner
