A big note of thanks to Chris Prior who presented on his experience undertaking a course on Photoshop through his membership of PSA at our March meeting. Chris is the first club members to undertake one of the many free courses that are available under PSA membership and to then present to our club and have his PSA membership fees reimbursed from the money that was raised from the running the Lake Macquarie national and international competitions in recent years by Roy Killen and other club members.

Bob Todd will give a similar presentation, this time on another PSA course at our upcoming April meeting.

The April club night will be at the Valentine Bowling Club at 7.00pm on Wednesday 12th April. Following Bob's presentation, we will have our normal break for refreshments and raffles, then the judging of our April print entries by Bill Chambers.

Membership 2023 - 2024

I can now advise that we have received approval from NSW Dept. of Fair Trading to become an incorporated association under the name of **Lake Macquarie Camera Club Incorporated**.

As an association independent from the club where we hold our meetings we will have to rely on fees, donations, sponsorships, and fund raising to generate the funds to run our new club. For many years Belmont 16s Sailing Club subsidised our photography club allowing us to charge a modest membership fee, but this will no longer be the case. To run the club effectively we need it to be in a sound financial position. To this end and in line with the advice I gave at our February and March meetings our annual club membership fees will be increasing to \$50.00 p.a. Maintaining our club in a sound financial position will allow us to offer good judges, presenters and offer a range of interesting and educational activities to our members.

When we were a sub-club to the Belmont 16s Sailing Club we required members to also be a social club member of the parent club. Similarly, to the arrangement with Belmont 16s we will also require that our members join the Valentine Bowling Club (VBC) as social members. This is in recognition that VBC do not charge us for the use of their function room for our meetings. The current cost for this membership is \$10.00 p.a. The committee recognises that this is a significant increase to what members have been paying in the past, but it is comparable to annual fees for similar clubs in the local area.

Membership for our new club is now open and will cover the period up to and including 30th June 2024. To join please complete the application form you will find on the club website and return via email to our club secretary Susan Slack. This form also includes the banking details so you can pay your membership fee. There are two forms. One a MS word document that you can

fill in if you are on a PC and another pdf version that you can print, fill in by hand, scan, and return.

VBC social memberships expire on the 30/4/2023. We suggest you pay your membership after that date to gain the full benefit. As soon as you have paid your annual membership, please take a photo of the membership card and send the image to Susan Slack.

In line with starting a new club we will also be making changes to our existing website to reflect the changes to our club's name. As you can appreciate this will take a little time. If you have the old club website bookmarked in your browser, you can continue to use that bookmark but change the name of the link to the new club name. SET SUBJECT APRIL 2023

Motion Blur

Judge: Dennis Archibald

Motion blur is a long exposure photography technique that lets you convey the feeling of movement or action in a still image.

Whereas some action shots freeze a moving subject with fast shutter speeds, motion blur uses slow shutter speeds for long exposure photos that blur the point of movement. Adobe defines motion blur photography as follows - "Whether you want to create a sense of speed with taillights streaking down a highway at night or capture the abstract look of people crossing a busy intersection, motion blur lets you see a scene in a way that lets you express a new perspective on reality.

Images may be in colour or monochrome and will be judged by how well the photographer has captured a feeling of movement and how does that movement contribute to the storytelling of the image.

3D Photography

This week, I had the good fortune to go behind the scenes at Newcastle Region Library. I visited their new DigiLab. There is some serious technology in this Lab.

One of the things that grabbed my attention was the <u>ORANGEMONKIE</u> It is used to record 3D images of artefacts held by the library. It is rather a simple piece of technology, consisting of a Foldio Light Studio which has LED lights. These may be dimmed or brightened. A turntable is placed within the light studio and the item is placed on the turntable. It is operated by a mobile phone app. It turns the turntable on and automatically takes the images – approximately 26. It then merges them together to produce the final 3D image, which may be used in catalogues, databases, social media and for personal use.

The resulting image that I saw was quite impressive.

A digital camera may be used to take the images. It is not costly. The Library has a basic set-up and it cost approximately \$350. Of course, there are various models which allow for more advanced work and the inevitable bells and whistles for those who become really serious!

Set Subjects for 2023

May – Rain through a window

Judge: Julie Brooks

Rain can be dramatic or it can be subtle, and as a photographer, it makes for unique photographic opportunities that most people don't think about until they see it in an image.

Capturing rain through a window is a wonderful technique for creating abstract rain imagery. Look for patterns in the raindrops and bright lights or colours outside the window for more interesting results.

Of course, not every rainy window picture is equally beautiful. To get a striking photo, you'll have to think carefully about your subject, technique, and composition.

Experiment with bright colours and bokeh, take images in mono, make the subject in your composition recognisable or, add a subject to the window.

June - Texture in Photography

Judge: Ruth Keech

Texture is the variation in depth of the surface of an object and refers to the way an object feels to the touch or looks as it may feel if it were touched. The appearance of this in a photograph can change with choice of lighting, focus, shutter speed and how far you are away from the object. A successful shot will give the viewer a sense of what the feel of an object is through the choices they make before they press the shutter button.

The purpose of this topic is to make the texture the main subject in the picture rather than enhancing another subject. Choosing the best lighting, distance, focus and shutter speed to depict the texture chosen will be used in judging. For the purposes of this competition, the textures should be captured in camera. Textures added using Photoshop are not allowed.

July - Night Photography

Images will be judged on their pictorial qualities, story-telling and originality.

The image must be taken after 1st January 2023.

September – Shooting an interesting shopfront

Judge: Sue Slack

We walk past great shopfronts every day and there is no need to travel far to shoot some of these. You may want to feature the whole front, the display, signs and you may want to include people, dogs, flowers etc in your shopfront photo. These can give different perspective and scale to the shot.

If you are stuck, click on this link below which has some handy hints to get you started. Remember to take lots of shots at different angles but straighten horizons, etc.

Composition will be key here and helps tell a story about the shopfront.

October – Animal or Human Living Body Parts

Part of the body must be the main focus of the image. No whole of body images. Animal or human, e.g. eyes, hands, feet, hair, chest, etc.

Can be colour or mono and must be taken from live subjects.

Some great results for our Club including:


- Equal second in the colour category, putting us in third place after two rounds.


Nature Round 2 of the section, our club gained 10th place and that puts us in 12th place for the season.


Critique Corner

<u>Critique Corner</u> aims to help members to fine-tune potential entries by gaining feedback from other members before the image is entered into a competition.

All members, regardless of experience are encouraged to upload images and make comments on images. The aim is to help each other to develop both your image capture and processing skills, and to take the judges' point of view when assessing an image. There are no grades within this activity.

Each member can upload one image per category. Once uploaded you can use this image in an upcoming competition. You can remove the image and replace it with another image whenever you choose.

Club Equipment

Please contact Greg if you would like to borrow any of the club's equipment, so if you need to borrow the mat board cutter, Spyder, scanner or, you would like to purchase mat boards to mount your images.

Greg's details can be found in the members link on the club website.

Normally, Greg would bring some boards along to competition nights for members to purchase at \$2 per board.

Print Mounting for our Club Competitions

This is a quick reminder that if you are entering print competitions please comply with the rules around the size of your prints and the matt boards you use to mount them. You can find these rules on the club website in the document 2022 Competition Rules - section 8 and 9.

In summary small prints may be no larger than 15cm X 10cm. There are no restrictions on large print sizes providing they fit within the size of the large print matt boards.

All prints must be mounted on a rigid mount board that is no thicker than 4mm (you can purchase these for \$2 each from Greg Carruthers).

For small prints the board MUST be 23cm x 18cm. For large prints the board MUST be 50cm x 40cm. The mount board may be of any colour.

There are a range of reasons for these rules some of which you can find in the club competition document. Keeping your boards to these dimensions means that we can efficiently utilise the space on the prints stands and means that you don't run the risk of having your print rejected on the night.

How to Make the Most of Your Print Competition Entry

Our judges have noticed that there have been some significant differences between how some prints have been presented compared to what may be seen on the screen.

It is important to note that judges on print competition nights are instructed to base all judgements & comments on the print in front of them and <u>not</u> the image that appears on screen for the benefit of the audience.

All members are reminded to make sure your uploaded image & mounted print show the same view. If your mount board requires a larger cut-out, then make sure it has the appropriately sized opening that corresponds to the view shown in the uploaded image.

If for example, as in image 2 below, the print is obscured by the mount-board, or is hard against the subject in the image, the Judge may allocate less points to your image.

It is important to note that the projected image will often show a brighter or, a washed-out version of your photograph simply because the screen shows transmitted light versus your print which is subject to reflected light. So, make sure that your print is as true to your original image as possible. Printing can be tricky and whether you print at home or have a 3rd party print your images ensure that you are satisfied that it truly reflects your photograph ensuring our judges see your work at it's very best.

This image has been mounted incorrectly and is covering much of the subject. The Judge may make a comment about this issue but, will still judge the merits of the print only.
