
This will be followed up with a nighttime photoshoot sometime between 27th May and the 31st of May, weather permitting.

"Framing in photography refers to the composition style of using natural or artificial elements to create a visual frame inside your image. Imaginative idea for the frame or use of the frame. Technically sound. Taken within 6 months of submission date. No images which only use negative space or blurred background as the frame

FOX AND BADGER

The fox and badger image was taken about 40 years ago, in woodland very close to home in the UK. A totally natural environment for these animals. I knew the badger sett and went down early one evening and set up ready for them to show, camera on a tripod, with 2 flashes. The image consists of 2 frames taken immediately after each other and later put together in very early Photoshop. The overriding memory of it was that the fox walked across my feet before joining the badgers, it was an outstanding moment in my wildlife photography journey.



CASTLE HILL SUNSET

This image is of an iconic landmark called the Victoria Tower at a place called Castle Hill near Huddersfield in Yorkshire, built to celebrate the 60th year of Queen Victoria's reign.

The shot is only possible at a certain time of year when the setting sun is in this particular position.

The Hill itself is also a scheduled ancient monument, with over 4,000 years of archaeological recorded history from Neolithic to Iron age to Roman encampments and then the Norman Conquest from 1066 onwards.

For anyone who perhaps watches" The Yorkshire Vet" on TV this icon is often seen in some of the overshots of the area where some of the filming is done.






WARRIORS OF XI'AN – TERRACOTTA ARMY

This image was taken in Xi'an, home of the Terracotta Army, discovered in the tomb of Qin, the first Emperor of China, and from whom China gets its name. They were built to accompany him as afterlife guards.

The images we took had to be quickly taken from viewing platforms, the public were kept moving all the time with no flash allowed. They are sited in undercover spaces as big as aeroplane hangers and where it can be dark in places. So not ideal for making the most of the amazing scenes before us. This army was created 2,000years ago.

In the recent competition Stephan had 3 images in the top 20 of the emotive portrait category



Photography in Australia: A tiny taste

Close your eyes and reflect on the life of a photographer in 1870. Not only did you need your huge camera, tripod and supply of glass plates, but you needed your portable darkroom as well. Glass plates lost their sensitivity very quickly.

So, there you were, recording places, events and people of the time. The equipment and the process did not allow you to take multiple shots in bursts. Your subjects were upside down in the view finder and they had to stand still for quite some time. No wonder they looked sombre with ramrod backs! Then you had to process the plate very quickly before it dried out.

The history of photography in Australia is a fascinating tale. One which is important to us all since the medium speaks to us in all languages. It is true that a picture is worth a thousand words. Of the many photographers who recorded our history, <u>Beaufoy Merlin and Charles Bayliss</u> must be my favourites.

Merlin and Bayliss were commissioned by Bernhardt Holtermann to record the rural gold mining towns, early Sydney and other localities. Some of the resulting plates were exhibited in Philadelphia and Paris. The 3,500 were found in a garden shed in Chatswood, 140 years after they had been made. They were acquired by the State Library of New South Wales and the restoration, and a digitisation project began. Some of the images were eventually exhibited at the State Library in 2013 and a magnificent catalogue was produced. One of the glass plates of early Sydney by Charles Bayliss in 1875 was found, smashed into hundreds of pieces. It weighed over 30 kgs. The original plate had to be carried up three flights of narrow stairs to allow the photographer to record an overview of Sydney. Using the combination of a 50 megapixel Hasselblad camera and digitisation, the plate was put together and a high-quality image was printed. See the story. Restoration of the Holtermann collection began in 2008.

My absolute favourite historical photographer is Frank Hurley, however that story is for another day.

Enjoy your photography, keep in mind the legacy that you will leave and don't ever complain about the weight of your camera gear or of the lack of bells and whistles!



MACRO CORNER - Bill Chambers



Jumping spiders are the personalities of the spider world. Although generally small, their large eyes, prodigious jumping ability, often brilliant colours, and cocky, inquisitive activity make them very appealing. Many of these spiders are daylight hunters, using their excellent vision to track, stalk, and calculate distance before suddenly leaping on their prey.

Although more prevalent in the tropics, they are found all over the world – even on Mt. Everest at elevations of 6705m (22,000ft)!

Here are some fascinating facts about jumping spiders in Australia:



The family Salticidae, commonly known as jumping spiders, includes 339 described species in Australia.

An additional 1000 species may be present but remain to be fully documented.

Jumping spiders are found in all terrestrial and arboreal habitats throughout the country.

These spiders have large, forward-facing eyes that provide excellent vision.

They use their vision to calculate distances, track prey, and navigate their environment.

These spiders are known for their curious and bold behaviour, often exploring their surroundings actively.

Their vibrant colours and intricate patterns make them visually striking.

Jumping spiders are skilled jumpers, capable of impressive leaps more than 50 times their own body length. Rather than relying on muscular strength to leap, Salticids are able to quickly increase blood pressure in their legs, causing them to extend & propel their bodies through the air.

Despite their small stature, they exhibit a lot of personality and are a favourite subject for Macro photographers, and capturing their unique features can result in spectacular photos. Here are six best tips for photographing jumping spiders:

Focus on the Eyes:

Jumping spiders are predators with excellent eyesight.

They often assess their surroundings and will sit still, tracking potential prey or threats with their large eyes.

Take advantage of this behaviour by focusing on the spider's eyes. Intense portraits with eye contact evoke emotional reactions in viewers.

Similar to human portrait photography, prioritize the eyes even when dealing with a thin depth of field in macro shots.

Get Low:

For captivating portraits, get as low as possible when photographing a jumping spider.

Being at eye level (or even lower) allows you to capture a direct view of their fascinating eyes.

Curious as they are, they often look straight back at you, resulting in great portrait shots.

Try Different Angles:



Experiment with varying angles beyond straight-on portraits.

Showcase the spider's interesting features by adjusting your shooting angle.

Different angles can visually describe the species and give your photos a unique look.

Use a Flash and a Diffuser:

A macro flash can provide even lighting and reduce harsh shadows.

Combine it with a diffuser to soften the light and create pleasing highlights.

Proper lighting enhances the details and textures of the spider.

Find Feeding Jumping Spiders:

Look for jumping spiders that are actively feeding on prey.

These moments capture their behaviour and add dynamism to your photos.

Patience is key; observe their movements and anticipate their actions.

Learn About and Understand Them:

Study jumping spiders' behaviour, habitats, and preferred environments.

Understanding their natural tendencies helps you predict their movements and get better shots.

The more you know about these fascinating creatures, the more successful your photography will be.

Remember, patience, observation, and a keen eye for detail are essential when photographing jumping spiders. Happy shooting!


Critique Corner
